**SPEAKER:** Anne Kiefer, Pittsford Central School District Coordinator for TIES (Together Including Every Student)



TIES promotes the participation of students with developmental disabilities in extracurricular and community activities by creating effective, natural support provided by trained student volunteers. The participants, students with special needs, have a rich opportunity for social growth through recreational activities. They often select activities where they have some potential. They have a chance to make choices and express themselves creatively. Activities that participants enjoy are swimming, basketball, track and field, scouts, school clubs, field trips, tennis, karate school, drumming circle, Hebrew School, church youth groups, soccer, and school activity nights.

The middle and high school aged volunteers who provide individualized support for the participants, have an opportunity to give back to the community. Group leaders serve as coaches, instructors, and scout leaders.

The TIES Coordinator is involved in promoting the program, enrolling participants and volunteers, training volunteers, developing support plans for participants, matching volunteers with participants, communicating with group leaders, and maintaining contact with constituent groups. There are currently 33 TIES participants and 61 volunteers in Pittsford.

Pittsford TIES belongs to a network of programs in a number of other school districts in Monroe County. The concept was developed by parents of children with developmental disabilities to create a successful, cost effective, natural way to include children and young adults with disabilities in community life. The Director of Special Education in Brighton said that "One aspect that deserves celebration is that TIES is for all students; it is an effort to unite children with peers so they can learn with and from each other. Their learning is enhanced by their diversity."

An interesting statistic from the U.S. Department of Commerce Census, "that the number of people who will experience disability in their lifetimes is almost 100%."
